## **Presidents' Address**

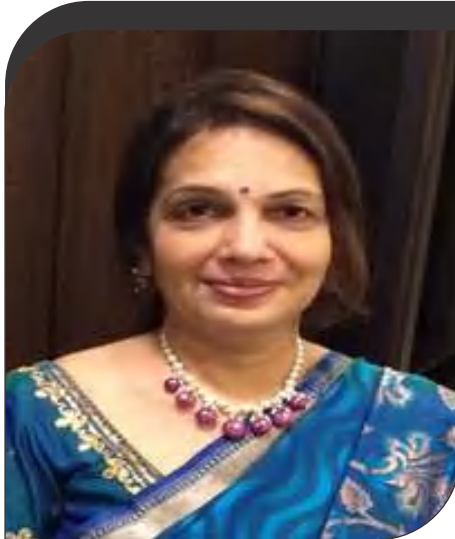
### **Adv. Shri. Mahendra K. Ghelani**

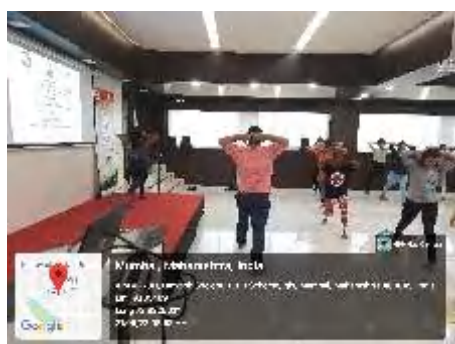

## ACTIVITIES AROUND THE YEAR

### INTERNATIONAL YOGA DAY

International Yoga Day is observed every year on June 21st to raise awareness about this ancient practice and to celebrate the physical and spiritual prowess that yoga has brought to the world. Yoga is a practice which plays an important role in relaxing the mind and body and boosting people's immune system. On 21st June 2022, in Juhu Mumbai, our college celebrated 8th International Yoga Day. It was



attended by many prominent

Professors, Principal and students from different courses of the College with great enthusiasm. The event began with a brief introduction of Yoga Day by Dr. Jitendra Aherkar and by welcoming the guest of honor Prof. Suraj Kumar Dubey, a Professional Yoga Instructor. He taught warm up exercises to all students and all the students practised & performed sitting and standing asanas, the importance of all of these were

explained simultaneously. The celebration concluded with a speech by our Principal, Dr Jitendra Aherkar. He encouraged students to practise yoga regularly to remain fit and improve concentration. He also addressed the participants on the importance of yoga practice in our life. All staff and students were taught the importance of Yoga in their life & how to maintain the harmony between body and mind. The students discussed the importance of yoga and practiced yoga poses and promised to introduce this activity in their daily lives. International Yoga Day celebrations ended with a huge success under the supervision of Prof. Shantaram Ayyar. The function ended with a vote of thanks by Prof. Shantaram Ayyar.



## WORKSHOP ON NEP-2020

A four-day workshop series was arranged from 21st June to 26th June to discuss the new National Education Policy and the Indian Knowledge System by our college in collaboration with Rani Durgavati Vishwavidyalaya. The workshop series included four sessions by eminent scholars.

### **Session 1, 21st June, 2022 - Indian Knowledge System and NEP 2020 – Implementation by Prof. Sanjeev Kumar Sharma.**

The first session began with speaker Prof. Sanjeev Kumar Sharma. According to him, the National Education policy has been designed to understand the obstacles in education. The main reason behind the policy making is to understand the requirements of today's generation, especially in their native languages, to bring about better outcomes. The late Prime Minister of India had said that English is a language that opens doors to a new world; however, this mentality has acted as a limitation rather than an opportunity for people from vernacular backgrounds. The new Education Policy works to keep our native languages alive, which are found to be declining due to modern perspectives day after day. He also spoke about how keeping in mind the Indian background is essential to strategize for the future. History has proved that people who are book smart are not necessarily capable of practical implementation of techniques for learning. Kalidasa once explained the philosophy of understanding to analyse the situation in a theoretical and practical manner. The expression of knowledge must be provided in an explicit manner which a student never realised before. A recent survey showed that around 3 crores of the population are capable and eager to pursue higher education, while the entire population of India is 132 crores. The National Education Policy is made with a holistic understanding to broaden the horizon of the education system.



### **Session 2, 22nd June 2022 - Good Academic Research Practices, by Professor A. D. N. Bajpai.**

Professor A.D.N. Bajpai began his session by appreciating MKLM's B. L. Amlani College and Rani Durgawati Vishwa Vidyalaya, which is listed as one of the top universities in India. According to Professor Bajpai, an advanced method is required to research a topic to elaborate on educational concepts, something beyond the basic books. More research work needs to be done, as the available knowledge is not sufficient to understand the current generation. Prof. Bajpai also spoke about the quality of research, emphasising that good research has no connection to the qualification of the researcher. He mentioned that education is often focused on providing certificates rather than inculcating knowledge, which contributes to unemployment. Many researches are just theoretically based and not used in practical applications.



National Education Policy must be framed in a manner that it could initiate all other policies that are relevant to the core concern. He also said that the teacher's perspective may develop if they work to find out something on their own, rather than merely relying on textbooks. Research work must be undertaken time after time by the professors to understand the changing scenario.

**Session 3, 23rd June, 2022 - Academic Bank of Credit by Professor Alok Chakrawal.**

Professor Alok Chakrawal was invited as a resource person for the third session, where he focused on improving the standards and level of educational channels for both urban and rural students in an equitable manner, with a focus on the Academic Bank of Credit (ABC).



Equality and a balanced situation must be maintained while providing and availing education. His idea aimed to promote higher education in regional languages for better understanding. A standard language must not apply to backward regions as they lack resources to grasp knowledge offered in English, especially important themes like technical education. Higher education aims to provide elective and optional subjects as per students' preferences, in any field they wish to gain knowledge and stabilise it. Content must be delivered while considering the listeners' requirements, and timely improvement of the education quality, by incorporating modern technology to understand the prepared content easily. The more access to technology and equality in accessibility, the higher the quality would increase automatically. It is of utmost importance to inculcate quality in students' involvement and learning process for a predetermined outcome.

Under UGC guidelines, the Academic Bank of Credit (ABC) uploaded a 10-page revolution on 11/03/2021, mentioning that students can design their curriculum by amalgamating various courses into one. Up to 40% of the courses are made available online, with 20% extra seats for the same. The National Education Policy is not designed to provide jobs but rather to make students self-dependent.



**Session 4, 26th June, 2022 - Educational Framework for Global Citizenship by Professor Shri Prakash Mani Tripathi.**

In his lecture, Prof. Shri Prakash Mani Tripathi emphasised the need for a multi-disciplinary approach towards different groups in Indian society. He stated that since 1991, people have started to embrace a global citizenship, and hence traditional methods of education should be supplemented with modern and

vocational education to promote holistic development. He suggested that education should be based on Sanskrit, which is considered as an authentic language of Indian culture. The National Education Policy must encourage the use of this ancient language to preserve our heritage. Some segments of the rural population still proudly speak Sanskrit as a part of their culture, and this must be promoted throughout the country.

The workshop series concluded with the vote of thank to all the speakers and dignitaries.



## Workshop on Intellectual Property Rights from 23rd June to 25th June 2022

A three-day Workshop on Intellectual Property Rights was arranged by our college from 23rd June to 25th June 2022. The workshop started with opening remarks of Ms. Drishti Khurana,



Assistant Manager, CIPAM. She explained to the participants the importance of IPR and how crucial it is for everyone to know more about IPR. She elucidated why research scholars, scientist, artists and everyone else should be well aware of the importance and advantages of patents so that they get a proper recognition and/or financial benefit over the creations of their minds for a certain period of time.



Later, Mr. Subramanian, Assistant Manager, CIPAM, DPIIT provided the students with foundational knowledge on Intellectual Property Rights and all the related concepts like Patent, Copyright, Trademark and Design, Geographical Indications and



other topics. He spoke to the students about how IPR is no more confined to the legal fraternity, but has spread across all disciplines because of which it has an impact and significance on arts, science, commerce, management and business. During the session the students were exposed to different types of intellectual property rights and they were enlightened and



motivated to convert their ideas into innovation and further to transform them into IP assets through the protection of their IP rights. The session ended with a vote of thanks to the guest speaker. On day three, Ms. Shilpa Priyadarshini, Lexorbis, conducted a lecture on IPR filing process in India - which included Copyright, Trademark, Patents and Design. She explained how to file a patent in India itself with respect to life science, biotechnology, computer science and physical sciences and also in the context of collaboration research. She briefed on IPR laws in different countries like USA, Germany, UK etc. The workshop concluded with closing remarks and vote of thanks.



## World Population Day Celebration

Our college organized a program on the account of World Population Day on 9th July, 2022 in collaboration with Dayanand Arya Kanya Mahavidyalaya, Jaripatka, Nagpur. Our Principal Dr. Jitendra Aherkar started the program by thanking all the colleges for this collaboration and universities for their participation in the program. 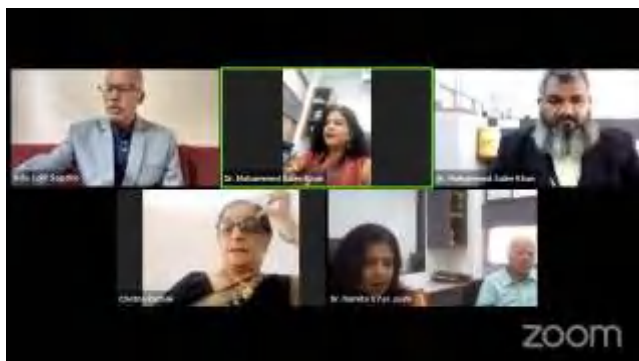

## Celebrating World Day for International Justice

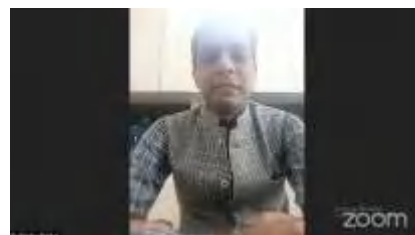

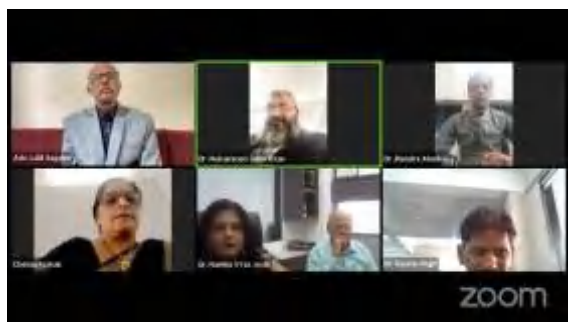

knowledge and guidance. Prof. Chetana Pathak, thanked all the guests, participants and participating institutes for their contribution towards the successful inauguration of the program. 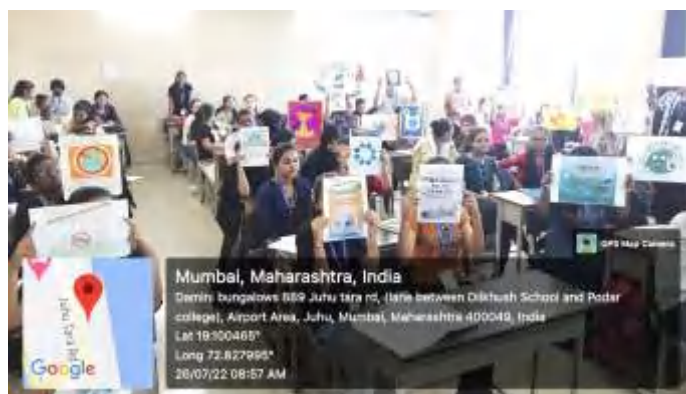


## "Say No To Plastic" Drive

## National Nutrition Week

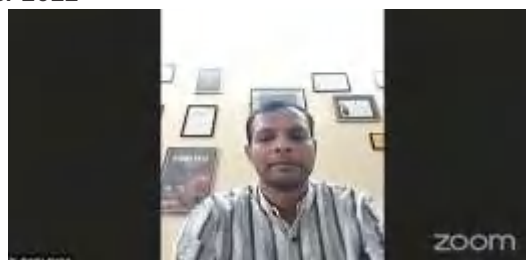

## "Women as Agents of Change for Disaster Risk Reduction and Resilience Building"

14th - 16th September 2022

An online three day training program was organised by the college in collaboration with the National Institute of Disaster Management for students. The training program included sessions by multiple scholars on the topics of the role of women in disaster management, risk reduction and building resilience.



### **Day 1: Report (Dated 14th September 2022)**

#### **Welcome Address by Principal**

The first day of the webinar, was started off by Dr. Jitendra Aherkar, principal, B. L. Amlani College of Commerce and Economics. He welcomed all the dignitaries and participants to the webinar. He gave an introduction to the webinar. He introduced Mr. Ali Haider, Junior Consultant at NIDM and Prof. Santosh Kumar, Head, GiDRR, NIDM. Dr. Jitendra Aherkar spoke about Disasters and Disaster Management. He then emphasized the role of women in Disaster Management and stressed on the need and importance of Disaster Risk Reduction. He concluded his speech by thanking NIDM for supporting and creating awareness in old and new students about disaster risk reduction and resilience building.



#### **Introductory Remarks by Mr. Ali Haider (Jr. Consultant, NIDM)**

Mr. Ali Haider introduced himself and welcomed all the participants and dignitaries including the Executive Director of NIDM, Mr. Taj Hassan. He started off by explaining to the participants the need for a specific emphasis on women in disaster risk reduction. In order to elaborate on his point, he gave an example of the World Bank Report. He also shed light on the report done by the London School of Economics on gender inequality in disaster management. He explained the issues related to post disaster construction and also envisaged the lead role of women in post disaster construction. He concluded his speech by acknowledging the need for sensitization of disaster risk reduction with special preference to women. Later, Prof. Santosh Kumar gave his initial remarks on this webinar. He started by giving a brief historical background, wherein women have taken the lead and protected the environment. He spoke about the difference in perspective in men and women in the context of risk of disaster. Prof. Santosh Kumar shared some insight on two important points: 1) Practical need of the gender and 2) Strategic need of the gender. He spoke about the importance of the strategic need of the gender. While concluding his speech he spoke about how this



webinar would empower the students and would help in the betterment of the society, environment and resilient living.

### **TECHNICAL SESSIONS**

**Day 1 – 14th September 2022**

#### **LECTURE – 1**

**Topic:** Gender and Climate Change: Issues and Concerns

**Speaker:** Dr. Nilima Srivastava

Prof. Saurabh Pagare introduced one of the resource persons, Dr. Nilima Srivastava, Professor from Indira Gandhi National Open University, New Delhi. She presented her views on Gender and Climate Change issues and concerns. She started her session by asking students to reflect on some important news on climate change, such as the extreme heat wave which had engulfed the entire Europe and US, causing evacuations and deaths. She also highlighted the news of the Pakistan flood which affected 30 million people. The aim of the session was for students to learn about climate change, the role of women in conservation of the environment and also about gender equity which would significantly help deal with climate change. She also mentioned how the environmental effect is more on women than men. She highlighted the point wherein women are much closer to nature than men, because of their involvement in agricultural work, domestication of animals, collecting fuel wood from forest and collecting and storing water. Dr. Nilima Srivastava highlighted 'Ecofeminism' which has linked oppression of women with environmentally destructive activities. She gave examples of the 'Chipko Movement', Narmada Bachao Andolan, etc. Later on, she spoke on Climate change and Agriculture. In this point she explained to the participants how climate change and agriculture are linked together and due to high usage of pesticides and chemicals is reducing crop and soil quality. She also explained its effect on increase in the air pollution, water pollution and greenhouse gasses. Dr. Nilima Srivastava also highlighted the causes of global warming. She explained how an increase in global warming would mean an increase in exploitation of natural resources, ultimately leading to an increase in land degradation, deforestation, destruction of habitat, etc. She later elaborated on previously mentioned various movements like Chipko Movement, Narmada Bachao Andolan and Beej Bachao Andolan.

In the next part of the seminar Dr. Nilima Srivastava stressed the point of environmental changes and its implication on gender. Due to increased environmental degradation there are multitude of problems faced by women such as the contamination of water, because of which girls and women have to pay the price in the form of poor sanitation. Similarly, unpredictable weather events also make women work harder and in miserable conditions. She also spoke about the impacts of climate change. She mentioned the importance of gender integration in climate policy. She explained how different gender roles of men and women influence the decision making in climate change. She also explained the gender analysis of carbon emissions. She cited an example of Sweden, wherein single men have more carbon emissions than married men. In the last

part of the session she spoke about gender equity, gender dimensions and gendered impacts on climate change which are essential aspects of climate change.

**LECTURE – 2**

**Topic:** Women's role in Mitigation and Management of Natural Disaster

**Speaker:** Dr. Ajay Kamble

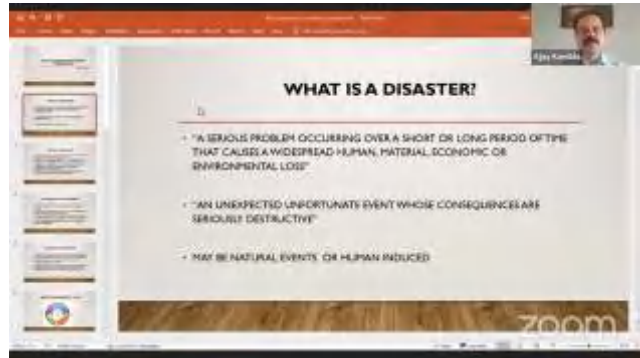
Dr. Jitendra Aherkar introduced the next resource person; Dr. Ajay Kamble, Vice Principal and Professor of Bhavans College, Andheri. He spoke about two important areas, namely disaster management and the role of women in disaster management. Dr. Ajay Kamble in his first part of the presentation spoke about disasters. He explained to the participants what disasters are and how they can be natural and human induced. Then he explained what natural and human induced disasters are and the differences between the two. Dr. Ajay Kamble also spoke about disaster management, disaster cycle and the role of women in disaster management. He highlighted the point of how women are more vulnerable to the effects of any disaster, due to various socio-economic factors. He gave an example of the 2004 Indian Ocean Tsunami, which killed 2,20,000 people, 75% of which were women. He stressed the importance of participation of women in disaster management. He mentioned how women are more psychologically stronger than men and are capable of taking more crucial decisions than men. Dr. Kamble mentioned that there was no significant data which showed participation of women in disaster management. There was data only on women being victims in disaster management. Dr. Kamble elaborated on the barriers faced by women which restrict them from participating in disaster management. Lastly, Dr. Kamble spoke about gender inclusion in disaster management.

At the end of the session, Prof. Nilima Srivastava and Dr. Ajay Kamble took questions from the participants and the first day of the webinar was concluded by vote of thanks which was given by Dr. Jitendra Aherkar.

After the recap, the first guest for Day 2 was introduced by Prof. Saurabh Pagare.

##### **LECTURE – 3**

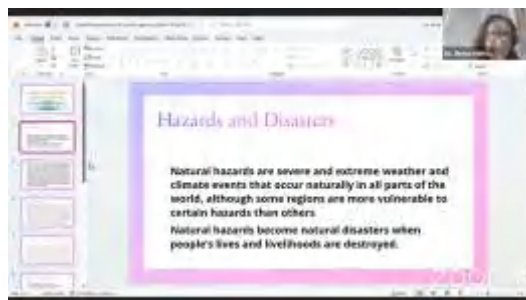
**Topic:** Disaster Management and a Feminist Approach

**Speaker:** Dr. Hema Mehta

Dr. Hema Mehta, Associate Professor, Tolani College of Commerce, Mumbai. In her session she spoke about disaster management and a feminist approach to disaster management. She started her session by discussing the traditional gender stereotypes in regards to masculine and feminine roles. Later she highlighted the point of gender equity and also gave a definition of the same. After explaining gender equity she elaborated on gender equality and explained the differences in the two. Dr. Mehta also spoke about hazards and disasters and different types of disasters. In types of disasters she discussed natural as well as human induced disasters such as floods, hurricanes, chemical leaks, electrical disasters, etc. She explained the risks and consequences of it and stressed the point of risk assessment.

In the next part of the session Dr. Mehta highlighted the points of how women are more vulnerable to disasters than men and disaster management is too gendered. She mentioned how due to gender inequality and less access to resources women are more vulnerable in a disaster. She gave a unique perspective of seeing disaster risk through the

perspective of women. According to Dr. Mehta women have unique perspectives on community danger and safety. She also mentioned that all the studies on hazard and disaster management should be gender sensitive. At the end of the session Dr. Mehta showed a video on gender and disaster management.

**LECTURE – 4**

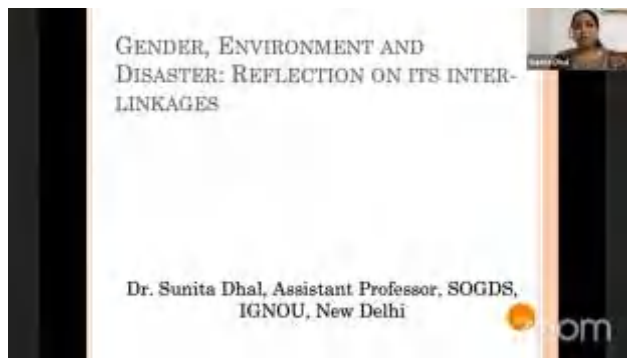
**Topic:** Gender, Environment and Disaster Management: Reflections from Below

**Speaker:** Dr. Sunita Dhal

Dr. Jitendra Aherkar introduced the next resource person Dr. Sunita Dhal, Assistant Professor, School of Gender and Development Studies, IGNOU, New Delhi. Dr. Sunita Dhal in her session spoke about gender, environment and disaster and reflection on its interconnectedness. She asked students to reflect upon a few questions which helped them gain more insight in this topic. Dr. Dhal also highlighted the point of connection between gender and environment. Later also mentioned the historical perspective of the environment and women. She explained the various feminist approaches taken to understand the environment. In this context, she highlighted the point of eco feminism, women in environment development approach, etc. In Ecofeminism she cited examples of how Vandana Shiva, Maria Mies argued that financial and environmental crises are gendered in nature. She also explained how eco feminism offers a critique on the capitalistic patriarchal society and also gave its examples which helped students to better understand the topic. In the last part of the session Dr. Dhal explained how the disaster impacts gender concerns. According to Dr. Dhal, disasters often reinforce gender inequality. She mentioned reforms in Disaster-risk management interventions and policies which are needed to aim at minimizing the gender gap in its outcomes. Dr. Dhal also highlighted research work done on food security which helped to gain insights in this topic. In discussing her work she mentioned the fieldworks which were undertaken in Odisha. Their project included climate resilient agriculture, seed saving techniques by

women and saving food grain by self help groups. Dr. Dhal concluded the session by highlighting points on Social learning by women, empowerment from grassroot level, etc.

The vote of thanks on day 2 was given by Dr. Jitendra Aherkar and day 2 of the webinar was concluded.

### **Day 3: 16th September 2022**

The commencement of day 3 was done by Dr. Jitendra Aherkar, principal of B. L. Amlani College and Mr. Ali Haider, Junior Consultant at NIDM. Dr. Jitendra Aherkar introduced the first resource person of the day Dr. Vibhuti Patel, Vice-President, Indian Association of Women Studies.

### **TECHNICAL SESSIONS**

#### **Day 3 – 16th September 2022**

#### **LECTURE – 5**

**Topic :** Disaster management Through Gender lens

**Speaker:** Dr. Vibhuti Patel

Dr. Vibhuti Patel started her session by introducing climate change through a gender lens and she highlighted the points of sustainable development goals. She also highlighted the gender concerns and elaborated on points such as disaster resilience, women as agents of climate change and access to resources to protect women from exploitation. Dr. Patel gave the definition of sustainable development. She mentioned Agenda 13 which highlighted the point of taking action to combat climate change and its impacts. She mentioned the development goals and the pillars of sustainable development. Dr. Patel emphasised on gender equality, explaining the feminist foreign policy. She also included the LGBTQIA+ community in this gender equality topic. To reiterate her ideas, she cited historical examples of Chipko movement, Apiko movement wherein women have saved



forests on which they heavily relied upon. She also highlighted how women should be included in the debate of climate change, land rights of women and fights against the draconian land ceiling act. She elaborated on women farmers, community workers, etc. She also highlighted the point of organizing workshops on disaster management which help women to better understand disaster risk management. Dr. Patel also mentioned how the future of agricultural rejuvenation is in the hands of women. Towards the end of the session Dr. Patel highlighted the Indian context, wherein women are extremely vulnerable to climate change. Later she cited examples of studies done by the UN, UNFPA, etc. She also highlighted the problems faced in the Asian continent by women. At the end of the session, Dr. Patel emphasized actual survival problems and real global success stories of women.

## LECTURE – 6

**Topic:** Women and Disaster: Mental Health Perspective

**Speaker:** Dr. Meenu Anand

The next resource person was introduced by Dr. Jitendra Aherkar, Dr. Meenu Anand, Associate Professor, Department of Social Work, University of Delhi. Dr. Meenu Anand spoke about Women and Disaster and Mental Health. The session conducted by Dr. Meenu Anand was an interactive session with the students. She started her session by giving the definition of Health by WHO. Later she defined mental health. Dr. Anand spoke about good mental health which is an important aspect of a person's well-being. She explained the components of mental health which included integration, autonomy, perception of reality and environmental mastery. She asked students an important question i.e. how mental health and mental illness are different. Dr. Anand explained the

difference between mental health and mental illness. This point included stress management, role of social support, self development, etc. Next she elaborated on the risk factors of mental illness and protective factors of mental health. She also mentioned the risk and protective factors for women which included points such as gendered socialization, expected roles from the society, etc. Coming to the point of women and disaster, Dr. Meenu Anand explained it by elaborating on pre disaster, peri disaster and post disaster perspectives. Towards the end of the session Dr. Anand solved queries which were asked by students.

Prof. Santosh Kumar gave his concluding remarks at the end of the session. He emphasised how we should bring back the value system which has gone in a different direction due various factors affecting interaction of the youth. He also mentioned the need to reflect on the values which were inculcated in our constitution, which are degrading day by day. He also highlighted the point of difference in mental health in men and women. Prof Santosh Kumar mentioned the outward and inward mobility which is present in men and women, respectively which helps them to vent out their mental stress in specific situations. He spoke about the stigmas associated with mental health and how these stigmas are different in men and women. He also explained how mental health directly affects physical health, giving a few examples. At the end of his speech he shed some light on the stereotype of gender roles and how men exercise their power on women. Prof. Santosh Kumar highlighted that with dialogues and discussions we can eradicate these gender discrimination, and that's why more and more of such sessions are required to help improve the status of women.

Thus, the webinar was concluded by vote of thanks given by Dr. Jitendra Aherkar.

**Training Outcome:**

The three days Online Training Programme On “Women as Agents of Change for Disaster Risk Reduction and Resilience Building” was conducted for undergraduate students who are studying foundation course paper as a part of their curriculum. The objective of this program was to sensitise students towards Disaster Management, with a feminist approach to it. Each and every student made an assignment based on the six lecture series

conducted during three days. The students would then present their assignments in the form of posters in the next semester, as a part of peer to peer learning outcome method.

### **Overall Key Take Aways**

- Environmental degradation in rural areas, issues faced by women in rural areas like being forced into prostitution resulting in numerous females ending their life.
- Women have no contribution in major decisions taken by the State or the Center and this needs to change.
- Contrary to the current perception, how women are more capable than society expects them to be.
- Disasters may be man-made or natural, impacting different genders in different ways.
- Various social workers are part of the society who help people in different ways, with the aim of improving the overall functioning of our society.
- Different types of disaster, which could happen unexpectedly at any time and their impact.
- Proper infrastructure and equipment are essential in dealing with disasters.



- Precaution is the crucial part in handling disasters, which influences the overall impact of disasters.
- Safety processes give more priority to men than women as most safety kits do not include sanitary products required for women.
- Women are far more stable during disasters, much better than men. They need

proper training to deal better with impacts of disasters. Women have inbuilt nurturing qualities to their surroundings.

- Sometimes women have a negative attitude towards participation in decision making. Reasons could be many like politics, disliked situations, authorities with poor mentality etc.
- Socioeconomic status where the work done by women is considered non-productive, like household chores.
- Empowering women in dealing with disasters would be a huge step towards disaster risk reduction for the entire country.



## Seminar on "Gender Bias and Rights : Mainstreaming Gender Equality"

A national seminar on "Gender Bias and Rights : Mainstreaming Gender Equality" was arranged by our college on 1st October 2022, in association with Western Regional Centre, Indian Council of Social Science Research. Dr. Jitendra Aherkar, our Principal welcomed the students and the dignitaries to the national seminar. He explained to the students the different tasks undertaken by the Indian Council of Social Science Research to promote research in social sciences. He thanked the dignitaries present, Dr. Dharmesh Mehta, Principal, Adhiya Law College; Dr. Frances Vaidya, Associate Professor, Gandhi Shikshan Bhavan's Smt. Surajba College of Education;



Dr. Pratima Singh, Principal, Chandrabhan College; Dr. Shraddha Anilkumar, Principal, Dayanand Arya Kanya Mahavidyalaya, for taking out the time to attend the seminar. Dr. Aherkar addressed how gender studies is still an understudied phenomenon and that being the motive for the organization of this seminar. He then highlighted the importance of mainstreaming gender equality to the students and its dire need for the college being a women's college. A poster presentation competition was

held in college during the seminar. Students presented posters made by their groups on various topics such as Gender Equality, Gender Discrimination, Pandemic and Humanity, Pandemic and Lifestyle Changes. Students from across streams and degree programs presented the posters made by them to the dignitaries and the audience. The Chief Guest Dr. Frances Vaidya, was the judge of the competition. She asked the students questions about their posters and also encouraged them during presentations. Ms. Sakshi Singh, student of U. P. G. Law College presented a paper on "Gender and Media". She explained how the portrayal of women as the weaker sex in the Indian media contributes to systemic discrimination and gender bias. She emphasized the need for



better representation of women in the media. She also explained to the students the steps that can be taken to change the narrative. Dr. Shraddha Anilkumar, addressed the students in her speech. She spoke about the gender spectrum and explained to the students how it is beyond the binary of only male and female. She stressed the importance of gender sensitisation in current times. In her presentation, she elaborated on the different obstacles faced by women and transgenders in familial, social, cultural and political lives but also highlighted the rights given by the constitution to women and transgenders. Dr. Frances Vaidya gave the closing remarks for the seminar. She congratulated and praised all the students for



making thoughtful posters. She also encouraged them to do even better. Apart from this, she also stressed the importance of gender equality in day to day life. She spoke about how as a society, we have normalized many injustices and discrimination and it is the duty of the next generation to correct it and make a better tomorrow. Different competitions were held for the students throughout the semester like Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav poster making, poster presentation, and Fireless cooking competition.

All the winners of the competitions were given certificates and felicitated by the chief guests Dr. Frances Vaidya, Dr. Shraddha Anilkumar and Principal Dr. Jitendra Aherkar. Winners of the poster presentation competition were also announced. A Garba event was also held in our College on 28th September, 2022. Students were awarded prizes for Best Costume, Best Dancer, Best Traditional Attire and Best Fancy Dress. All the guests congratulated the students and praised their efforts. Asst. Professor Sharvani Shirgaonkar gave the vote of thanks. She thanked the Indian Council of Social Science Research for sponsoring the event and helping throughout. 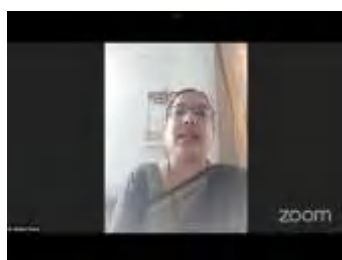
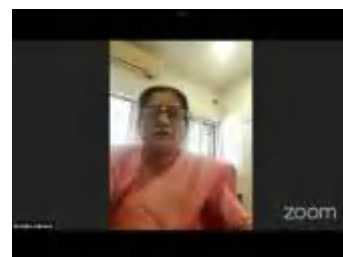
Prof Chetna Pathak welcomed the guests and participants to the Lecture Program. Dr.

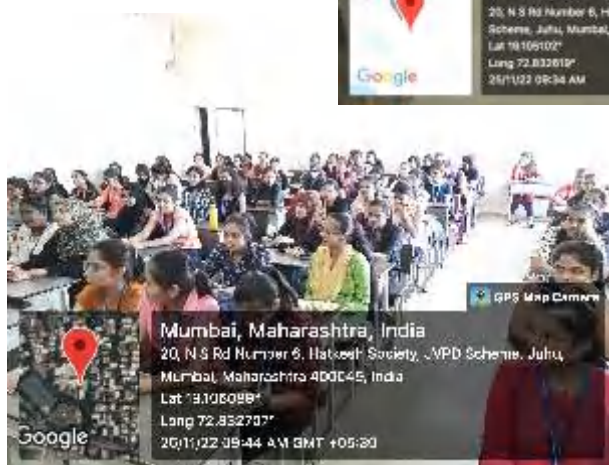
# Seminar on Intellectual Property Rights Awareness

A seminar on Intellectual Property Rights Awareness on 25th November 2022 was arranged in college. Seminar started with opening remarks by Mr. Jatin Darve, Examiner of Patents and Design, Ministry of Commerce and Industry, Government of India. He provided participants with basic knowledge on the concepts of Patent, Copyright, Trademark and Design. During the sessions, the students learnt about how the IPR



provides protection for creations and inventions, how it enables creators and inventors to earn recognition and financial benefits from the work. Mr. Darve explained to the students the main purpose of intellectual property law, which is to encourage the creation of a wide variety of intellectual goods. Intellectual property rights refers to the general term for the assignment of property rights through patents, copyrights and trademarks.

These property rights allow the holder to exercise a monopoly on the use of the item for a specified period. Students were taught how IPR restricts copying others' ideas and how this helps the development of new ideas for the betterment of the society. The session ended with a vote of thanks to the guest speaker.



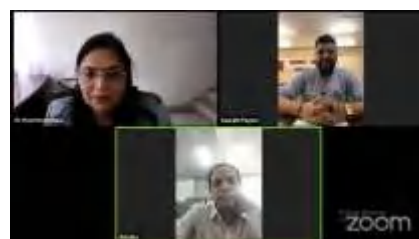
## National Conference on Microfinance : The Integrated Process of Development

A National Conference on Microfinance was organized on 7th December 2022, in online mode. Dr. Rajeshwari Rana welcomed the participants and keynote speaker Dr. Naresh Sukhani, Professor from Usha Pravin Gandhi College of Commerce. Dr. Sukhani explained to the participants how Microfinance provides people with access to credit and other financial services to start and grow businesses, build productive assets, and better cope with financial shocks at interest rates typically well below those charged by traditional moneylenders. Microfinance is not a so-called development panacea but it offers robust platforms for the delivery of complementary services that are needed and frequently requested by the poor people. MFIs no doubt do business, but with their limited manpower and plan, they provide a limited amount of money for the limited period of time to their limited clients at a limited rate of interest and rule regulations.



Dr. Shraddha Shukla, Asst. Professor from Shailendra College of Commerce, the next speaker stressed that Microfinance has proven to be an effective tool for poverty reduction and equal development of an economy. However microfinance has insufficiently penetrated the poorer strata of society. The poorest form the vast majority of those without access to primary health care and basic education. Similarly, they are the majority of those without access to microfinance. While there is no question that the poorest can benefit from primary health care and basic education, it is not as intuitive that they can also benefit from microfinance, or that microfinance is an appropriate tool to reach all the goals of development.

Dr. Pratima Singh, Principal of Chandrabhan College of Commerce was the next speaker. She focused on how microfinance has been extensively examined over the past 15 to 20 years, and the resulting literature on its effectiveness for economic development is now available. Microfinance alone is insufficient to create any immediate positive ground to reduce poverty and the number of poor. If MFIs are combined or integrated with other developmental and poverty reduction pro-poor programmes then what will be the actual scenario is the question that should be addressed. Dr. Singh also stressed that it is necessary to have an integrated effective approach. She stated that our aim is to develop a scalable strategy for delivering integrated microfinance and other services that can meet the multifaceted needs of poor people. In the path of inclusive growth and sustainable development of an economy, feasibility and effectiveness of an integrated microfinance approach is the way to go.





## Seminar on Student Development and Career Counselling

A seminar on Student Development and Career Counselling was arranged on 23rd January 2023 by our college in association with Arya Vidya Sabha's Dayanand Arya Kanya Mahavidyalaya and Smt. Saraladevi Satheshchandra Agarwal Government College, Bellary.

Prof Chetna Pathak welcomed the guests, Dr. Shraddha Anilkumar, Principal Arya Vidya Sabha's Dayanand Arya Kanya Mahavidyalaya, Dr. Jitendra Aherkar, Principal MKLM's B. L. Amlani College of Commerce & Economics, M. R. Nathwani College of Arts and Dr. Manjunatha Reddy H. K, Principal and Smt. Saraladevi Satheshchandra Agarwal, Government College, Bellary. students should try to see the skill set that is required for that job and then assess whether they meet the skill set or in which areas they need to improve themselves.

Professor Chetna Pathak thanked Dr. Dhiraj Ambade for his time and his valuable input. She then thanked the Principals, faculty members and the students for their participation.

## Celebrating India's G20 Presidency

India's G20 presidency is one of a kind event to display Indian-ness that underpins peace, harmony, and development for all as the cornerstone of its state behavior on the global stage. Principal Dr. Jitendra Aherkar spoke to our students about the rich intellectual heritage of our country which is the foundation of the thought "Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam". This holds even more significance as we have been celebrating the Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav. Principal Sir also gave a brief history of G20 to the students. The Group of Twenty (G-20) comprises 19 countries (Argentina, Australia, Brazil, Canada, China, France, Germany, India, Indonesia, Italy, Japan, Republic of Korea, Mexico, Russia, Saudi Arabia, South Africa, Turkiye, the United Kingdom and the United States) and the European Union. The G20 was founded in 1999 after the Asian financial crisis as a forum for the Finance Ministers and Central Bank Governors to discuss global economic and financial issues. It was upgraded to the level of Heads of State/Government in the wake of the global economic and financial crisis of 2007, and, in 2009, was designated the "premier forum for international economic cooperation". The G20 Summit is held annually, under the leadership of a rotating Presidency. Keeping this in mind the college hosted poster making event in collaboration with Department of Lifelong Learning and Extension, University of Mumbai.

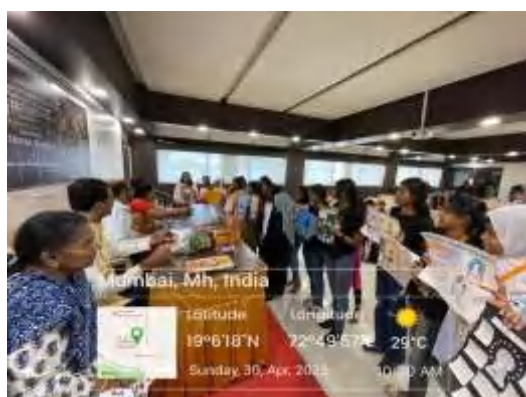




## NATIONAL SEMINAR ON WOMEN AND BUDDHIST PHILOSOPHY

The College organized one day national seminar on Women and Buddhist Philosophy along with Department of Arts sponsored by Western Regional Centre-ICSSR (New Delhi). Dr. Jitendra Aherkar inaugurated the seminar with the welcome note. Dr. Sunita Magre-Head of the Department of Education graced the seminar as a keynote speaker. She highlighted that in ancient India the position of women does not appear to have been a very happy one. Generally women seem to have been looked upon as being inferior to men. And, at times they were considered as being on the same level as the Sudras, the lowest of the four castes. Their freedom was extremely limited. The general view appears to be that they had to be under the care of parents in their childhood, under the protection of husbands in their youth; and in their old age they had to be under the control of their sons. Therefore, it was thought that they do not deserve any freedom. Their main role was considered to be that of housewives, managing the affairs in the house according to the wishes of their husbands. Gender issues are common to all societies and traditions. Buddhism has been no exception. The Buddha's reluctance to admit women into the Sangha, the fact that the monastic code for nuns had special rules requiring them to be always obsequious of monks and the unfavourable manner in which women are sometimes referred to in the texts are the background against which this discussion is conducted. However, there is also the record that the Buddha said women were capable of attaining the four stages of awakening and that he was unstinting in his praise of those nuns whose attainments were reflected in the wisdom of their discourses, which we also learn from the textual sources. Dr. Badiruddin- Professor of Ravi Naik College-Ponda, Goa graced the seminar as a Chief Guest. He focused that Lord Buddha emphasizes the fruitful role the women can play and should play as a wife, a good mother in making the family life a success. In the family both husbands and wives are expected to share equal responsibility and discharge their duties with equal dedication. The husband is admonished to consider the wife a friend, a companion, a partner. In family affairs the wife was expected to be a substitute for the husband when the husband happened to be indisposed. In fact, a wife was expected even to acquaint her self with the trade, business or industries in which the husband engaged, so that she would be in a position to manage his affairs in his absence. This shows that in the Buddhist society the wife occupied an equal position with the husband. Later doctrinal developments in Buddhism reflect this dual scenario- women were idealized as consorts and dakinis, but at the same time, they had to be reborn as males as a pre-condition to attaining full Buddhahood. Buddhist feminism is a movement that seeks to improve the religious, legal, and social status of women within Buddhism. It is an aspect of feminist theology which seeks to advance and understand the equality of men and women morally, socially, spiritually, and in leadership from a Buddhist perspective. The Buddhist feminist Rita Gross describes

Buddhist feminism as "the radical practice of the co-humanity of women and men. Later technical sessions were graced by Prof. Amar Salve- HVPS Law College. Ghaptkopar. Participants and students presented their views on the seminar subthemes and an open debate was organized on these issues and also examine how far these issues and concerns remain prevalent in the modern world. Vote of thanks was proposed by Prof. Sharvani Sirgonkar.

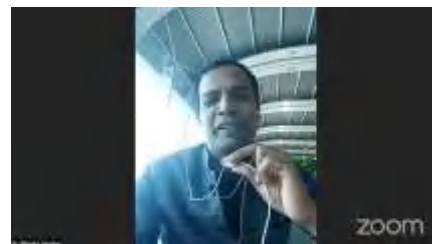

## **Promoting Financial and Inclusive Growth**

30th April 2022

An online multidisciplinary national level e-conference was arranged by our college in collaboration with the National Bank for Agricultural and Rural Development on promoting financial and inclusive growth.



Principal Dr. Jitendra Aherkar welcomed all the participants & Resource persons to the e-conference. He thanked the National Bank for Agricultural and Rural Development for jointly organizing the conference with B.L. Amlani College of Commerce and Economics. He also expressed his gratitude towards NABARD for providing financial assistance for the conference. He gave a brief introduction about the National Conference on Financial Inclusion and Inclusive Growth. He highlighted the role and importance of NABARD. He explained the objectives of the conference which were teaching the participants about microfinance, financial literacy. He stressed upon the importance of having such conferences to the researchers as well as the participants across India.

### **Keynote Address**

Dr. Sandeep Kulkarni, AGM, Financial Inclusion and Development Department, RBI-Mumbai Regional Office, in his keynote address gave a brief introduction about the concept of financial inclusion and inclusive growth. He stated that financial inclusion may be defined as the process of ensuring



access to financial services and timely and adequate credit where needed by vulnerable groups such as weaker sections and low-income groups at an affordable cost. He mentioned the aim of financial inclusion is to bring in digital financial solutions for the economically underprivileged people of the nation. It also intends to bring in mobile banking or financial services in order to reach the poorest people living in extremely remote areas of the country. He elaborated on multidimensional composite Financial Inclusion Index (FI-Index), which has been constructed based on 97 indicators which quantify the extent of financial inclusion and is responsive to availability, ease of access, usage, unequal distribution and deficiency in services, financial literacy, and consumer protection. He concluded his session by conducting a Q&A session, where all the participants got a chance to get their queries resolved.

### **Technical session- I**

Dr. Reni Francis, Principal, Pillai College of Education,



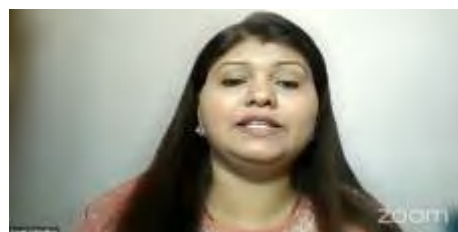


began her session by introducing the concept of financial literacy. She stated that financial literacy is the ability to understand and effectively use various financial skills, including personal financial management, budgeting, and investing. Financial literacy is the foundation of your relationship with money, and it is a lifelong journey of learning. The earlier you start, the better off you will be because education is the key to

success when it comes to money. She explained that financial literacy includes paying off debt, creating a budget, and understanding the difference between various financial instruments. In sum, financial literacy has a material impact on families as they try to balance their budget, buy a home, fund their childrens' education or ensure an income post retirement. She also explained to the participants the concept of inclusive growth. Inclusive growth means economic growth that creates employment opportunities and helps in reducing poverty. It means having access to essential services in health and education by the poor. It includes providing equality of opportunity, empowering people through education and skill development. She then elaborated on various dimensions of inclusive growth and concluded the session by thanking the college for this opportunity.

### **Technical session-II**

Prof. Sonali Chikhalikar, Corporate Trainer and Financial Advisor, began her session by introducing the Unified Payments Interface (UPI). It is a system that powers multiple bank accounts into a single mobile application, of any participating bank, merging several banking features, seamless fund routing and merchant payments into one. It also caters to the "Peer to Peer" collect request which can be



scheduled and paid as per requirement and convenience. She gave the participants information about different UPI apps available on the internet for all users. These apps include Google Pay, Paytm, BHIM Pay app etc. She also explained to the participants the do's and don'ts of digital payments and how to securely use these platforms. She concluded her session by solving the doubts of participants.

### **Review of Research papers**

Prof. Shantaram Ayyar gave a brief review of research papers published by various researchers across our country from different universities and colleges on the theme of Financial Inclusion and Inclusive Growth. He mentioned a few notable research papers with abstract. By explaining the important conclusions of all the research papers, he fulfilled the objective of supplementing knowledge of participants on the Financial Inclusion and Inclusive Growth theme.



### **Valedictory Address**

Dr. Pratima Singh, Principal, Chandrabhan Sharma ASC College, Mumbai, began her valedictory address by explaining the meaning of financial inclusion. Dr. Singh stated that financial inclusion refers to universal access to a wide range of financial services at a reasonable cost. It broadens the resource base of the financial system by developing a culture of savings among a large segment of rural population and plays its own role in the process of economic development. She highlighted that RBI has adopted a bank-led model for achieving financial inclusion and removed all regulatory bottlenecks in achieving greater financial inclusion in the country. Further, for achieving the targeted goals, RBI has created a conducive regulatory environment and has provided institutional support for banks in accelerating their financial inclusion efforts.



Dr. Singh concluded the session by thanking all the resource persons and participants for attending the conference. She thanked the resource persons for enlightening the participants with their knowledge. She acknowledged NABARD and B. L. Amlani College of Commerce & Economics for giving her opportunity of being a valedictory speaker in this E-conference.

### **Seminar Outcome**

The seminar on Promoting financial and Inclusive Growth made us understand that financial inclusion allows people to make many everyday financial transactions more efficiently and safely. It also expands their investment and financial risk management options by using the formal financial system. This is especially relevant for people living in



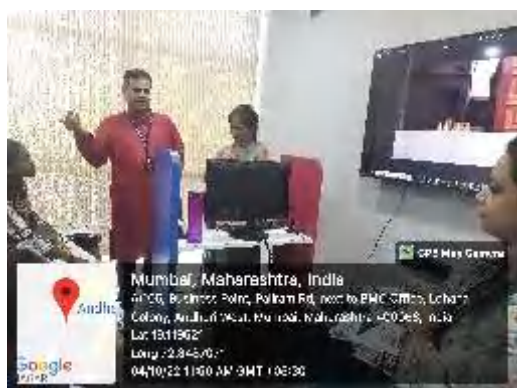
the poorest 40 percent of households. Yet not all financial products are equally effective in reaching development goals, such as reductions in poverty and inequality. It was also learnt that the biggest impacts in financial inclusion and inclusive growth come from savings accounts – provided that they are inexpensive and serve a specific purpose – and digital payments. The findings from research papers suggest that people with insurance invest in riskier, higher return technologies, though little is known about its impact on welfare measures. The research on measuring the impact of financial inclusion has been rapidly growing in the past couple of years. But research on the impact of the different dimensions of financial inclusion on economic development is still in many ways at its beginning. Financial Inclusion has far reaching consequences, which can help many people come out of abject poverty conditions. Financial inclusion provides formal identity, access to payments systems & deposit insurance. There is a need for coordinated action between the banks, the government and others to facilitate access to bank accounts amongst the financially excluded. Financial Inclusion is the incorporation of all sections of the society under the umbrella of the formal financial sector. It is crucial in achieving inclusive growth and hence sustainable development and economic growth. Worldwide there is a clamor for achieving inclusive growth but the workings of a developed, developing, in-transition and underdeveloped country vary extensively. Hence, the policies implemented in one do not work efficiently in the other.



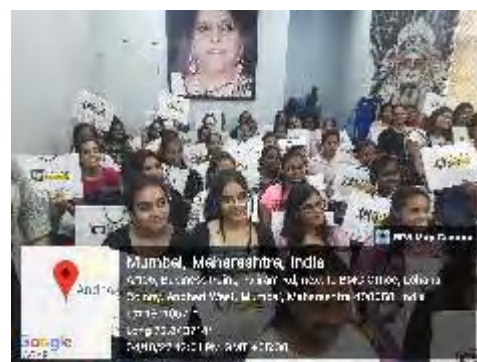
## STUDENTS EXCURSIONS

The main issues found by the students in the areas were water shortage, lack of water filtration system for drinking water, lack of proper infrastructure for transport and commuting. The survey was great learning experience for students as they got to do field work and got an understanding of how data for survey research is collected.



The data that was collected in the survey was submitted online to the Unnat Bharat Portal.



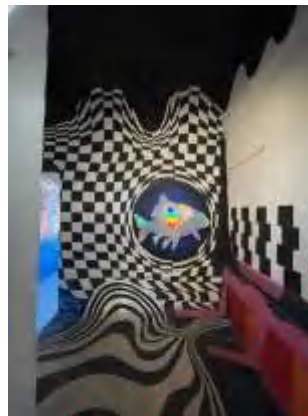
## MUMBAI ART FESTIVAL

Ayyar. The officials at SEBI explained to the students the evolution and essentiality of SEBI in the Indian Share Market since 1991. The policies, authorities, duties allotted to SEBI along with their functions were

explained to the students. Students were also taught about the manner in which SEBI works on a daily basis and especially SEBI's current market regulation which helps small and medium investors. Students learnt about various regulations that SEBI has put in place to protect investors and ensure transparency in the securities market. They provided some techniques to invest in the share market. At the same time, students were advised not to invest without in-depth knowledge of the shares, to gain prosperity with balancing risk factors. Towards the end of the lecture, a small question answer session was kept so that students could get their queries resolved. It was a great practical learning experience for the students as they gained insight into the functioning of the securities market and the role of regulatory bodies in ensuring its integrity.





## STUDENTS CELEBRATIONS

### ASHADHI EKADASHI CELEBRATION

Ashadhi Ekadashi, is the most important Ekadashi vratha observed as the first Ekadashi. It falls on the eleventh day in the bright half of Ashad Maas. Ashadhi Ekadashi is more of a religious procession festival, celebrated widely in Maharashtra during the months of June- July (Aashaadh Shukla paksha). People consider the two eleventh days, "Ekadashi", of every month to be of special importance. But the



eleventh day (bright) of

Ashadh is known as the great Ekadashi or Mahaekadashi. This Mahaekadashi is also known as Shayani Ekadashi, because on this day Vishnu falls asleep to wake up four months later on Prabodhini Ekadashi in the Kartik month. Our college celebrated the Ashadhi Ekadashi Festival on 09th July 2022.

Prof. Sonali Chikhlikar presided over the festival and was also the convenor for the program conducted in college. Our Principal, Dr. Jitendra Aherkar gave a wonderful welcome speech for the program, he also gave brief introduction to the cultural and historical importance of the day. He



explained why this particular festival is celebrated by people. All the Professors and staff along with students took active participation in the celebration. A group of twenty-one students performed lezim dance under the choreography of Prof. Sonali Chikhlikar. Students were enthusiastic and joyful, also performed foogdi in college campus. The festival traditionally involves a Palkhi Yatra. In Maharashtra, on the occasion of this festival Varkari conducts a Pandharpur wari. Pandharpur Wari is a yatra to Pandharpur, Maharashtra, to honor Lord Vithoba. It involves carrying the paduka of a saint in a palkhi, most notably of Dnyaneshwar and Tukaram, from their respective shrines to Pandharpur. Many pilgrims join this procession on foot. Warkari is a Marathi term which means "one who performs the wari". The tradition is more than 700 to 800 years old. Our college took inspiration from the theme and made a dedication to Mumbai Police, saying that "Mumbai Police is an institution which preserves peace in the city and protects citizens from being victims of crime". The college conducted Wari with Paalkhi yatra heading towards Juhu Police station to pay greetings to the Police Officers. Dr Jitendra Aherkar greeted ACP and PSI along with constables of Juhu Police Station on behalf of the college. In this way, our college celebrated this festival with unique ideas along with grace.

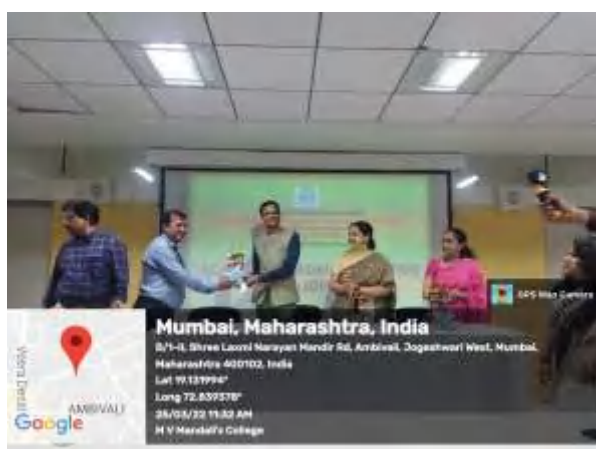
